UC Students prepared for crime situations

Prevention is better than cure. It is for this reason that the country's top Criminology school, the University of the Cordilleras, formerly Baguio Colleges Foundation (UC-BCF) educates its students to escape from harm and to protect themselves when needed.

More than 2,500 undertaking the National Service Training Program (NSTP) of the University of the Cordilleras were given tips on maintaining safety and basic crime "negotiation" techniques last August 6 at the UC campus.

The students were educated regarding the "modus operandi" or common crimes and drug initiation proaches, including the safeguards against them. This will be followed with basic selfdefense through karate and aikido among other martial arts on August 18.

National Commission (NAPOL-COM-CAR) Director Rodolfo Santos co-sponsored the activity while speakers from the Philippine Enforcement Drug Agency and the Badiscussed Drug Abuse Prevention, the Anti-Hazing Law and Crime

The August 18 module will deal with survival skills that students could use in drastic situations where direct confrontation can no longer be avoided. Survival techniques including selfdefense maneuvers will be taught.



poll system was created under the supervision of Engr. Eliseo Ruiz of the College of Information and Computing Sciences (CICS). "At first it was a

stand-alone when developed and used in 1997, but in 1999, we were able to

implement a network system for it," said Engr. Ruiz.

CICS was certified by the Commission on Higher Education as the Center of Development for Excellence (CODE) for Information Technology.

UC-CICS has been sharing the program to other colleges for the past four years. This 2006, engineering, accountancy and nursing students were able to benefit from the automation process.

"All the students did was input their student ID number and click beside the name of their chosen candidate," said SSG Adviser Mr. Benjamin Alo, who also disclosed that the system was safe.

To avoid flying voters, student ID access numbers were automatically blocked upon voting. Votes were automatically tallied.
