# UC's Folayang settles for Silver in Doha Asiad

UC's Education student Eduard Folayang was an inch in clinching the gold, but he settled for the Silver after bowing to Chinese favorite Cu Yanfei in the 70-kilogram final round in Wushu combat sports during the recently concluded SEA games. Earlier injuries of Folayang when he mellowed Khosrow Minoo of Iran in the semifinals did not prevent the Baguio boy from holding his stand against his toughest Chinese opponent. As expected, China ruled wushu which is considered their traditional martial arts.

Schoolmate Mark Eddiva and another Baguio fighter Rexel Nanghayna of the RP squad were ed in their wushu were eliminated initial bouts but luck struck Rene Catalan who won the gold in the 52 kg with no Chi-nese opponent and easily winning over an injured Vietnamese pľayer.

Folayang won the gold during the 23rd Southeast Asian Games and a silver during the World Wushu Cham pionship. Another UC champion in wushu, Benjie Rivera, a three time world wushu time world wushu champion was eased out in the Doha games but will be playing in the next SEA games.



## Academe responds to the plight of migrant workers

Everyyear, around 2,000 skilled and unskilled Filipinos leave the country to provide security for their fami-lies, but the irony of it all is that they leave their families insecure in the process. Their children are left to fend for themselves and experience physi-cal or sexual abuse cal or sexual abuse from their guardians. In several instances, marriages break up caused by the couple's physical separation.

This was revealed

in the launching of the forum on the Localization of the 2006 State of the World Population Report held at the Baguio Country Club last December 12, 2006 funded by the

United Nations Population Fund and con-ducted by the Univer-sity of the Cordilleras with the support of the National and Regional Offices of the Population Commission.

While migration working Filipinos has many significant gains like money for education and a better standard of living, there are also high prices to pay – the risk of maltreatment in foreign lands and the disintegration of the families left behind. In the Cordilleras, many women have suffered indignities like being harassed and overworked by their em-ployers as shared by Ms. Brenda Ananayo,

an Ifugao who worked in Hong Kong for five

"The negative effects of migration have a greater impact on the youth and we, in the academe, are in a strategic position to reach out through our community extension programs," shared Mrs. Edna Tabanda, Director of the UC Community Extension Services Office.
