Upgrading the credentials of its law faculty thereby boosting the standards of legal education offered by the University of the Cordilleras, twelve of UC's College of Law faculty were conferred the degree Master of Laws LL.M., by the San Beda College on June 22, 2013, at the SBC commencement rites held at the SBC campus in Manila.

In 2010, UC received a CHED Grant, after being named as one of the country's top 20 law schools. Thereupon, Dean Reynaldo U. Agranzamendez and the UC law faculty decided to devote the fund grant to the UC Law faculty development program, entering into an agreement with the San Beda College of Law to conduct its Master of Laws program at the UC campus in Baguio City. required the gram graduates to com-plete 48 academic units in 16 subjects in International En-Law, vironmental Multinational Corporations and Philippine Law, Forensic and DNA Evidence, Forensic E-Commerce and Law and Rules on Electronic Evidence, among others. A prerequisite to graduation required the completion of significant research papers and projects in wide-ranging subject areas and fields of the LL.M. degree program.
