## UC-BCF is champ in Accountancy quiz

Dean Ramsay Colorado of the College of Accountancy said winning duo Dexter Espiritu and Raymund Escala will represent PICPA Baguio-Benguet in the regional competition.

He said that UC emerged as regional champion in 2004 d u r i n g th e c o m p e tition in Curimao, Ilocos Sur. a n d h a s b e e n consistent first runner up for years 2000-2003.

UC Chairman of the Board Jesus Salvosa congratulated the students, their teachers and dean Colorado for living up to established standards of the school.

Colorado said almost all UC accountancy winners in past competitions passed the CPA board and later absorbed into the faculty of UC. "They are worth emulating", he said.

Students were shown various ethnic dances differing in dance steps, beating of gongs, costumes, and dialects.

The College of Teacher Education through Dean Miriam Janeo delighted students with a live mannequin show where beautiful models garbed in different tribal attire posed in elegance. Cordillera products on display and a video cultural review were also coordinated by CTE.

The tribal dances and colorful live mannequins attracted local and national photojournalists who joined the Cordillera celebration and at the same time, to reminisce their student days in UC.

Not to be outsmarted, the College of Hotel a n d R e s t a u r a n t Management treated visitors, students and faculty with indigenous delicacies in appetizing presentations such as binagoongang camote and sayote tops, squash in meat ball forms, the usual pinikpikan, pork chop and sweetened banana and camote mix.

The destiny of the Cordillera region and its resources was discussed in a debate between four contending debating teams on July 21 at the UC review center organized by the College of Arts and Sciences and the UC Debate Society. The parties debated on whether to live in a developed and modern Cordillera or in a preserved environment but remaining in poverty.
