The UC chief counselor guided the public school teachers on their role such as helping students achieve adjustments in making important life decisions, undertaking the task of working towards positive change and coping with different issues such as pre-marital sex, dating and family problems, among other things.

"It is but imperative that teachers be tapped to provide counseling not only because of the limited number of guidance staff in schools, but because students are more comfortable approaching and confiding to those they have come to trust," Adina said. Adina said.

UC-BCF student chefs earn highest scores


