BAGUIO CITY – Enrolment is now on-going here to train globally competent Mas-ter Teachers in Special Education and English as a Second Language. The University of the Cordilleras formerly Baguio Colleges Foundation an-

nounce that they are now offering two new courses starting this second trimester - Master of Arts in Teaching English as a Second Language and Master of Arts in **Teaching Special Education.**

Dr. Cleofas Basaen, dean of the UC Gradu-ate School said the new course offerings is in response to the growing demands of language globalization and cial care for children with special needs

Locally however, Basaen said the great influx of foreign students prompting the establishment of English Tutors and Learning Centers and agencies requires English teachers prop-erly equipped with the necessary professional teacher's knowledge in teaching proper English language. The ESL program has courses like Linguistics, Phonology, Language Acquisition and Supervision and

among others. The University of the Cordilleras also recognizes that although there are schools that cater to the needs of visual and hearing-impaired students, many children with other special conditions like autism and learning disabilities like dyslexia are left with very few teachers who are properly trained to capably provide the special instruction and guidance

that they need, thus, the MAT-SPED program. With the local and

international demands for SPED and English teachers, graduates of education courses and behavioral science courses are also given the opportunity to spe-cialize in SPED.

Those who are inclined towards a career in English instruction on the other hand will greatly benefit from the MAT- ESL program.



Presidential medals and bronze plaques were awarded to Dr. Cleofas M. Basaen, Dean of the UC Graduate School and Dr. Alfred J. Herbolario Director for Research and Development for be-ing Outstanding Univer-sity Dean and Outstand-ing University Project Director, respectively. Both also received citations for being Exem-plary Educators of the Philippines. The two UC educators were among twenty exemplary citi-zens from different fields nationwide conveyed Public Service Awards given by the Leadership Organization of the Philippines Incorporated held at the Manila Pavilion last September 9.

Jails make criminals out of youth inmates

"Juvenile delinquents become master criminals by the time they get out of jail." This was observed

by Mr. Ray Dean Salvosa, Managing Director of Consuelo Foundation and guest speaker in a forum on juvenile jus-tice system before University of the Cordillera Students sponsored by UC-BCF, Commission on Higher Education and the National Police Commission.

Ray dean Salvosa told UC-BCF students that the reason for his observation is because juveniles share with adult offenders the same crowded cells in "pig sty" state. Also, there are no comprehensive rehabilitation programs to redirect their lives towards a meaningful path Ac a result the path. As a result, the children mostly end up becoming chronic of-fenders who go behind bars from time to time.

While it is expensive to solve jail sys-tems, there is a cheaper solution -- providing peaceful and nurturing home-life.

UC students mostly from the UC college of nursing were exposed to harsh realities of prison life for child of-fenders through video documentation and statistical data presented by Salvosa. "Our juvenile jus-

tice system is punitive rather than reforma-tive", Salvosa contintive", Salvosa contin-ued. "The thing is, these juveniles do not have to be put to jail in the first place", the solution accordingly is to break the cycle of violence by es-

tablishing a strong and stable family. UC students re-solved to be more vigilant in addressing youth victimization and to support program support programs that address and prevent involvement in alcohol, drugs and gangs and to strengthen their own ties with their families.



Abortion rise alarms School

The rise in abortion cases blamed on poor knowledge and sexual freedom has alarmed colleges and universities in the City.

To protect its stu-dents, the University of the Cordilleras immediately responded to the alarming reality by embarking on a continuing Adolescent Reproduc-tive Health Seminar and information drive.

Poor knowledge was identified as the prime cause of incidents in unwanted pregnancies, abortion and sexually transmit-ted illnesses according to the Guidance Center and Peer Facilitators of UC during a seminar last month participated by more than 200 Social **Orientation and English**

students. Dr. Jessie Diaz, a gynecologist from the Baguio General Hospital and resource speaker of the seminar said that Baguio City has the second highest number of abortion cases in the entire country, with rates increasing a month or two after enrollment in June and before the final examinations in March. Diaz enlightened Dr. students about miscon-ceptions on sex brought about by cultural orientation as well as the dangers of abortion.

UC Guidance Di-rector Judith Adina also warned students against the possible conse-quences for pre-marital sex and irresponsible behavior.

It could be recalled that UC Peer Facilitators for elementary school pupils earned UC Peer Facilitators Organiza-tion a slot in the Ten Accomplished Youth Accomplished (TAYO) Organizations Award in the entire Luzon area by the National Youth Commission NYC last July 28 for their project on Early Educa-tion on Reproductive Health among elemen-tary grade pupils.
